Becky spoke about the 2022 Iowa's Local Governmental Public Health System report issued by IDHHS. Becky also discussed an email from Dr. Kruse, the State Medical Director, about exploring public health infrastructure in the future. Becky discussed the Opioid Response Funding Committee process, PPE supplies organization at the EOC, and Emergency Preparedness plans.

Kristina spoke about attending the YMCA's Senior Health and Fitness Fair on May 31, 2023. Employees are updating their Hep-B vaccinations. A couple of communicable diseases cases have required home visits.

Bags were distributed Healthy Kids Day at the YMCA with coloring books, cups, first-aid kits, stick-on tattoos and child abuse prevention materials and handed out 125 on April 29, 2023. Melissa attended the successful PCM' School's Mental Health Advocacy Day on April 28, 2023. We handed out about 150 journals purchased by CICS and expressed the positive benefits of journaling. Melissa installed 2 car seats in April as well.

On June 23, 2023, we will invite the students who participated in the Safe Around Water class at the YMCA, and their families to join us for a pool party at Maytag Pool. We will be handing out bags with summer safety items and healthy snacks for the kids to take home as well. This event and the Health Kids Day are part of our annual CPPC plan and funded by CPPC.

Home Care: We have 7 clients with 1 with Home Instead. Total Billed hours in April were 49.5 and the total amount paid was \$1732.50

MICA'S Learning Communities

IDEA (Inclusion, Diversity, Equity & Action) Members held MICA's first Equity Summit in February. Guest speaker Tom Rendon provided training on working with families using an equity lens.

Trauma Informed Resiliency Team Promoting wellness initiatives at MICA. May's wellness challenge is to get at least 10 minutes of physical activity outside each day.

Data & Process Committee Working on the coordination of inter-agency referrals and analyzing the recent community needs assessment to strategically plan future programming.

MICA Health Service Programs:

1st Five - a public-private partnership bridging primary care and public health services in Iowa.

Breastfeeding Peer Counseling - Peer Counselors are paraprofessional women, who have successfully breastfed despite barriers and challenges, and are enthusiastic about sharing their breastfeeding experience and knowledge with women of their culture and language. Peer counselors work closely with WIC and healthcare providers to promote breastfeeding in their communities.

Child Care Nurse Consultant - CCNC's are Registered Nurses who provide on-site consultation, training, and technical assistance to early childhood care and education providers.

Child & Adolescent Health - promotes the health of Iowa's children, youth, and adolescents by providing health care services through public and private collaborative efforts.

EPSDT/Informing - a program for children to receive preventive health care services including oral health services. Helps families understand Medicaid benefits.

Hawki - health coverage for uninsured children of working families. No family pays more than \$40 per month. An affordable option for families with income that does not qualify for Medicaid.

I-Smile - connects children and families with dental, medical, and community resources to ensure a lifetime of health and wellness.

I-Smile @ School - school-based dental sealant program, which is an important and effective public health approach in promoting the oral health of children and adolescents. Placing sealants on molar teeth significantly lowers the probability that decay in those teeth will occur.

Maternal Health - works to ensure optimal health for pregnant, birthing, and postpartum mothers, ensure more babies can celebrate their first birthday (prevent infant mortality), and improve birth outcomes.

Pick A Better Snack - educational lessons for students K-3, to promote physical activity and healthy eating. The goal is to increase fruit and vegetable consumption and encourage healthy lifestyle choices.

TOP - Teen Outreach Program at Miller & Lenihan Schools in Marshalltown. These programs focus on healthy relationships, making good choices, being a good citizen and community engagement.

WIC - WIC families include infants and children up to 5 years old and women who are pregnant, breastfeeding or have had a baby in the last 6 months. WIC provides monthly food benefits to eligible participants as well as nutrition education and support.

Additional Health Program Updates:

Child Care Nurse Consultant (CCNC)

We have a second Child Care Nurse Consultant, Jenn West, working in Jasper and Poweshiek Counties. Jenn is completing her training and observing Tara Berstler, Child Care Nurse Consultant for Boone, Story, Hardin, Marshall and Tama Counties. Together they will provide support to local childcare providers to improve health and safety, ensuring quality early learning environments are available for young children.

WIC

WIC has seen an increase of just over 100 participants from March to April of this year. Food Insecurity continues to be one of the top concerns of families coming into MICA for services. We will begin to give out Farmer's Market checks to all WIC participants beginning in June. All pregnant and postpartum participants will qualify for a set of checks as will infants 9 months and older and children ages 1-5. The dollar amount increased from \$27 to \$30 for this season and qualifying participants will receive checks in \$5 increments. The checks can be used anytime this summer through October 31st. This is on top of their regular WIC benefits, it does not replace any of their WIC benefits. Families can either call our office or pick up their checks at their appointments this summer.

Breastfeeding Peer Counseling

The BFPC team continues to support local women as they start or continue their breastfeeding journey. Peer counselors are on call any time to help moms work through common breastfeeding issues. They are available to meet with families in person, virtually, over the phone or through text or email communications. These support mechanisms give moms the education, support and confidence needed to continue breastfeeding their baby, which provides numerous health benefits for both mom and baby.

1st Five

1st Five welcomes local Peer Consultant, Dr. Tara Andersen, from Ames McFarland Pediatrics. Tara will serve as the local expert on developmental screenings and is able to assist other providers and clinics with development screening workflow. 1st Five has also seen an increase in the number of referrals recently. Developmental Support Specialists are working hard to get families connected to early intervention services.

Maternal Health

The Maternal Health Program provides education and support services for pregnant women in our 6 county service area. We have recently started a Maternal Health Coalition and will be meeting again in June. This group will allow providers and community partners a time and space to dive into local services, gaps or barriers to services and ways to better support maternal health initiatives in Central Iowa. On June's agenda will be the state of maternal mental health in Iowa. Child Health

The Child Health Team travels to all counties in our service area to provide services such as immunization reviews, developmental screenings, lead testing, oral health screenings and fluoride varnish to children when they come in for WIC appointments. Since October we have completed 126 lead tests, 322 ASQs and over 1,400 oral health screenings. These screenings lead to important resource and referral connections to support children's growth and development.

Pick A Better Snack

Pick A Better Snack is wrapping up lessons for the school year and will be providing short lessons with Bobcat U in Marshalltown again this summer.

I-Smile

The I-Smile Team is finishing school sealants for the year. The Sealant team has placed 1,373 sealants since October 1, 2022. In addition, 764 kids received dental screenings at school through the sealant program. The I-Smile Coordinator also completed school dental audits and will be compiling data to share later this summer.

Our New Local Peer Consultant

Dr. Tara Andersen, DO: McFarland Ames Pediatrics

The Iowa Department of Health and Human Services (Iowa HHS) has recently implemented new collaborative service areas (CSA's), which have redefined Iowa HHS program boundaries for 1st Five, WIC, Maternal, Child, and Adolescent Health (MCAH), I-Smile, and Title X clients. In the spirit of increased collaboration, we have enhanced the 1st Five Peer Consultation resource to now include a local primary care provider champion chosen to support our primary care practices and providers in the MICA CSA. This enhancement means local peer support is available for 1st Five partners related to screening implantation, workflow, and 1st Five referral processes. We have brought on Dr. Tara Andersen from the McFarland Clinic Pediatrics, Ames, to provide this peer consultation to our local 6 county CSA. She is available upon request (virtually, or in-person, to provide this resource to our local 34 clinics in Boone, Story, Marshall, Tama, Jasper, and Poweshiek Counties.

Dr. Andersen has worked with the 1st Five program since 2020, and has been a champion in providing developmental screenings and making 1st Five referrals for her birth to 5 year old patients. She is familiar with screening implementation, clinic workflow, the 1st Five referral process, and the challenges that can arise for busy providers as they establish their commitment to universal developmental screening and referral pathways to 1st Five.

Peer consultation support provided by Dr. Fishbane-Gordon and Dr. Kramer will continue to be available to allow for added flexibility and your tailored needs.

Community Partner Feature: Early Access and AEA

An Important Referral Resource for Developmental Delays

What is Early ACCESS?

Early ACCESS is the early intervention program through Iowa's Area Education Agencies to provide home-based services for infants and toddlers ages birth-3 years old. These services are provided to children that have a health or physical condition that may affect his or her growth and development or have developmental delays in his or her ability to play, think, talk, or move.

Why is this resource important?

The first three years of a child's life are the most important when setting the foundation for ongoing development. Starting supports and services early improves a child's ability to develop and learn. The focus of Early ACCESS is to support parents to help their children learn and grow throughout their everyday activities and routines. This means Early ACCESS service providers work with parents and other caregivers to help their children develop to their fullest potential.

What is AEA?

AEA is the intervention and education program that provides Special Education services to preschool age children ages 3-5 years old (our program demographic), as well as school age children.

These Special Education services comprise about 80 percent of the AEA budget and include:

- Academic Consultants
- Behavior Consultants
- Hearing
- Occupational Therapy
- Physical Therapy
- School Psychology
- School Social Work
- Speech
- Vision

Why is this resource important?

Iowa's AEAs are committed to supporting schools in promoting healthy learning environments that address the social, emotional, behavior, and mental health well-being of students.

*1st Five routinely refers to Early ACCESS/AEA for developmental delays such as speech, gross motor, and fine motor development, as well as behavioral and sensory processing concerns.

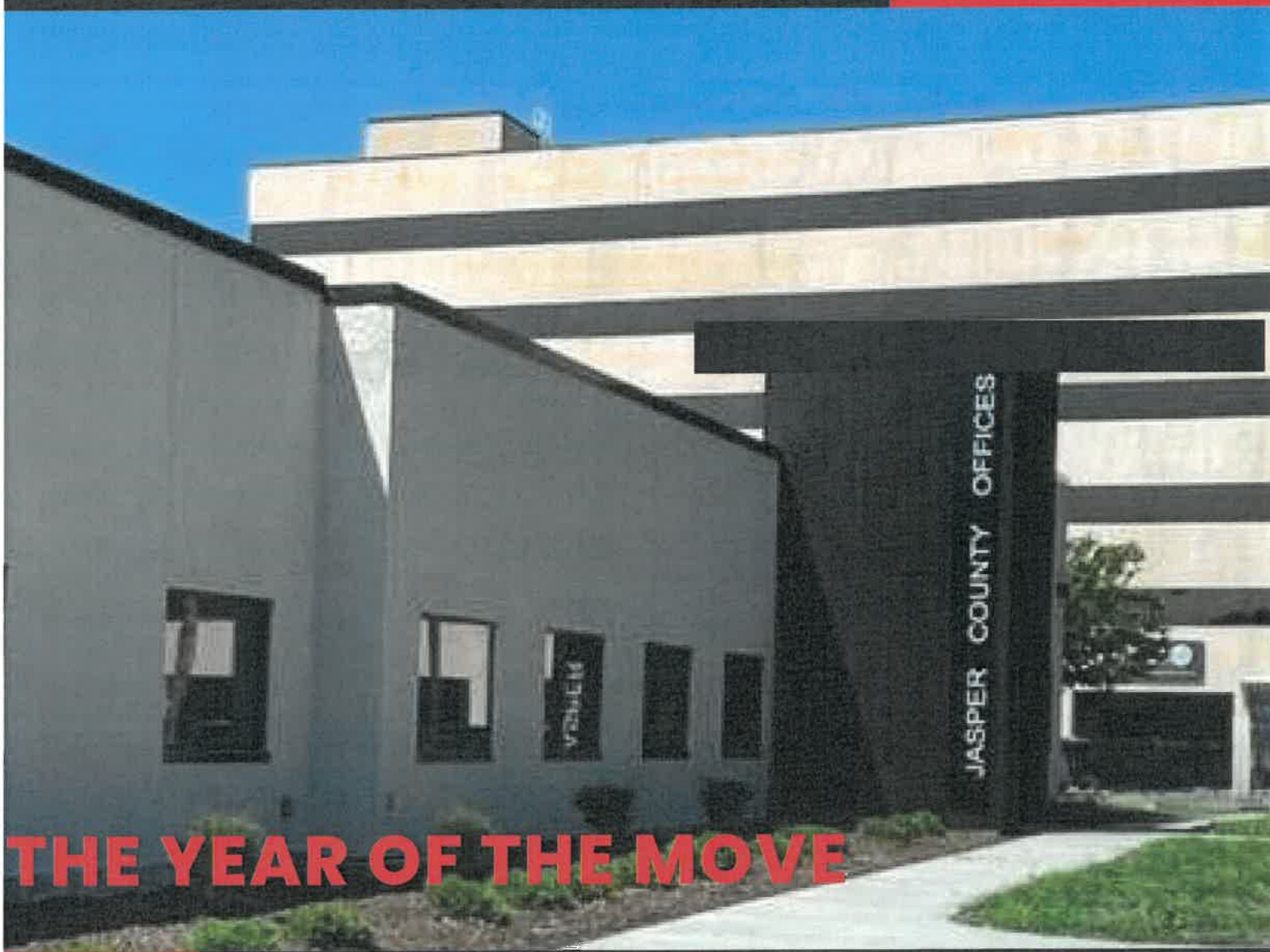

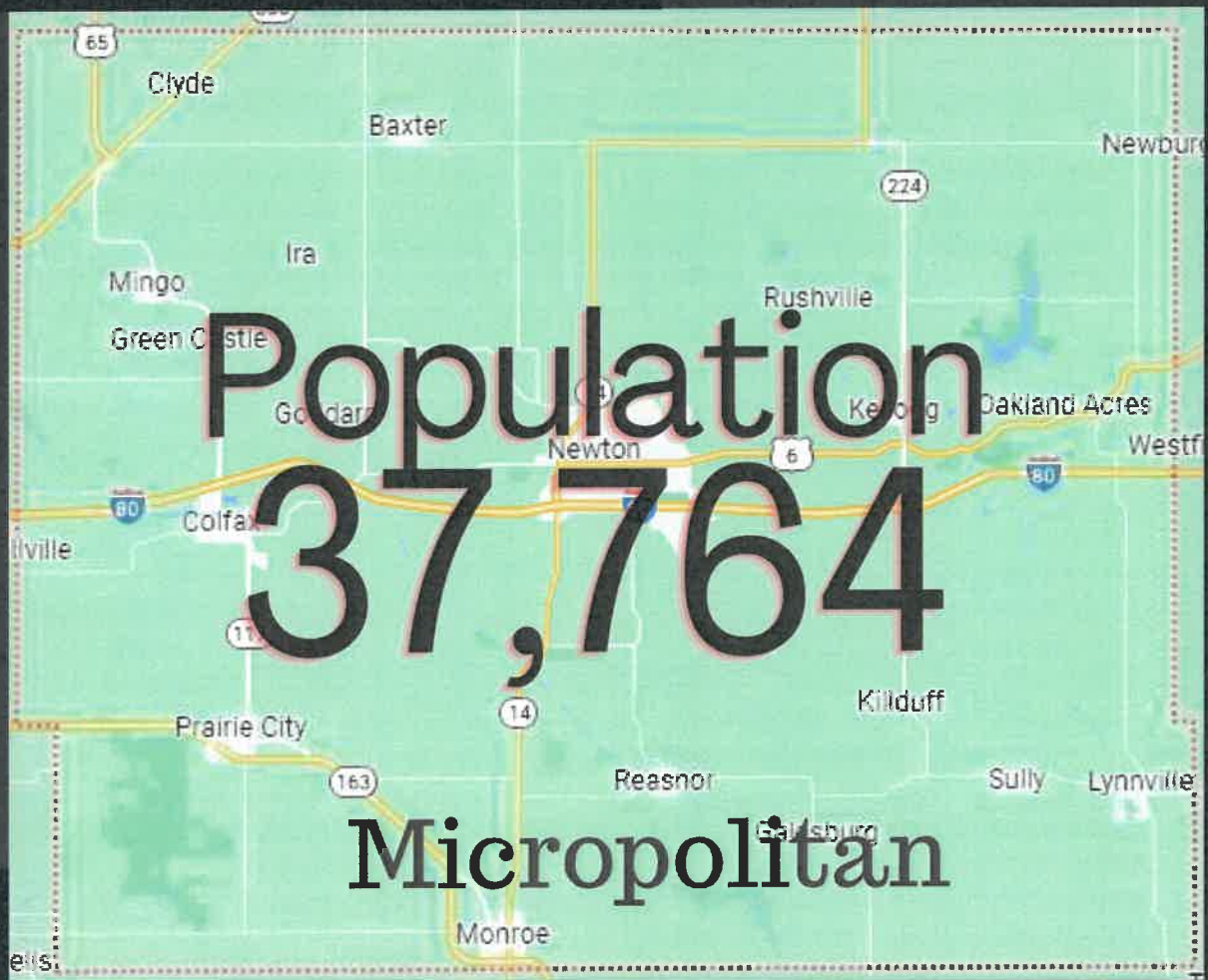

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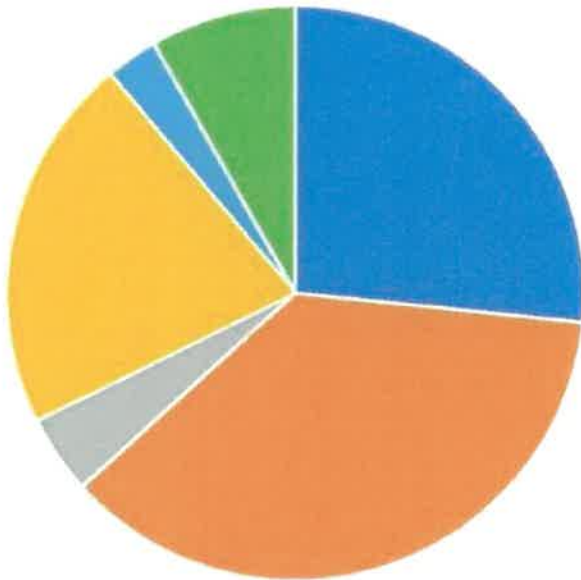

DO YOU KNOW YOUR WARNING SIGNS OF SUICIDE?

If you're worried you or your child showing any of these behaviors, talk to them as soon as possible.

- Feeling down or hopeless
- Withdrawing from you, friends or other family members
- Having major changes in their sleep, eating or activity levels
- Withdrawing from activities they used to like (sports, music, etc.)
- Suddenly giving away possessions
- Talking about or writing about wanting to hurt or kill themselves
- Being uncharacteristically calm or happy
- Feeling hopeless or worse about the future

HOW TO START THE CONVERSATION

This is good. Start with a question about your child's behavior.

Some questions you can ask include:

- How do you feel about school lately?
- Do you ever feel like hurting yourself?
- Do you ever think about suicide?

Make sure you explain your children's behavior to you. Listen and acknowledge them in a supportive way.

Teach your children that nobody is responsible for making sure they know they can talk to you. Especially if they've been thinking about suicide.

IMPORTANT THINGS TO REMEMBER

Talking about suicide does not make someone suicidal. In fact, it may be the opportunity they need to opening about their feelings.

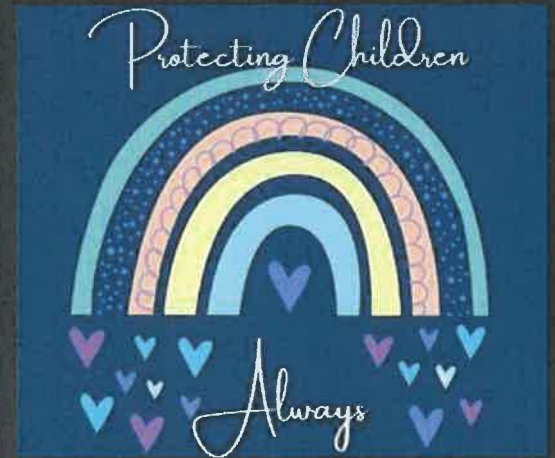

Addressing this issue at a unique moment in time, HHS aims to redefine what service delivery looks like in Iowa. There are endless opportunities to harness the expertise and passion of our health and human services workforce, better leverage existing financial resources, and to continue to engage and support our community partners and local stakeholders while acknowledging the evolution of our state's resources and population.

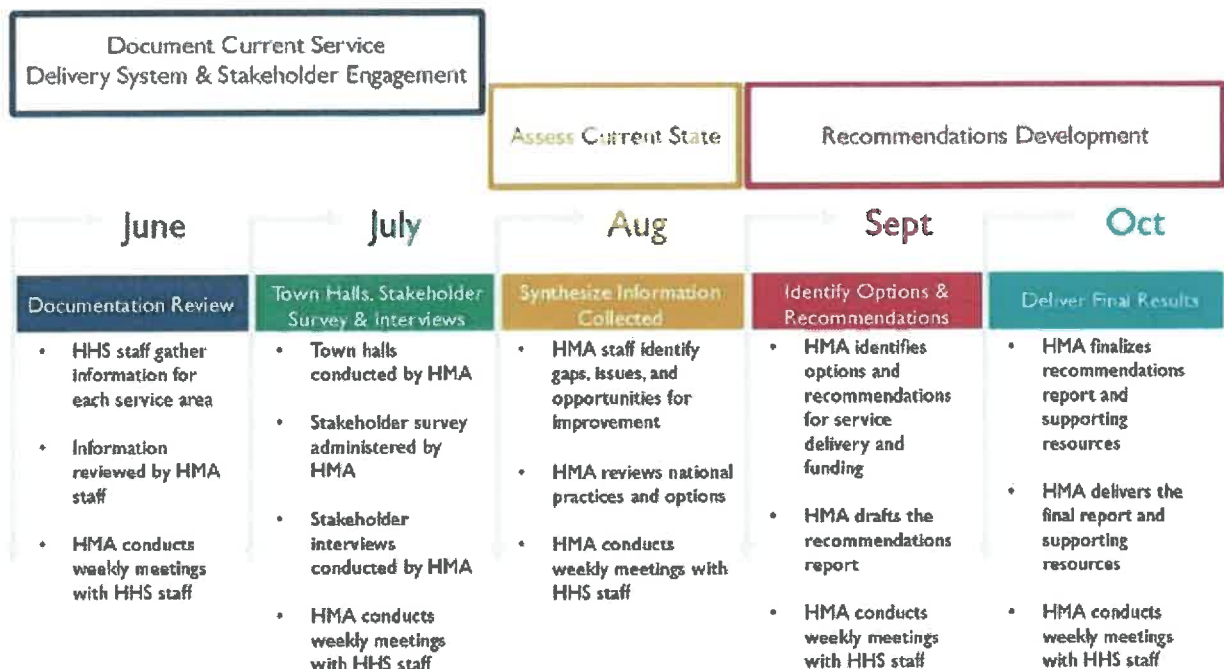

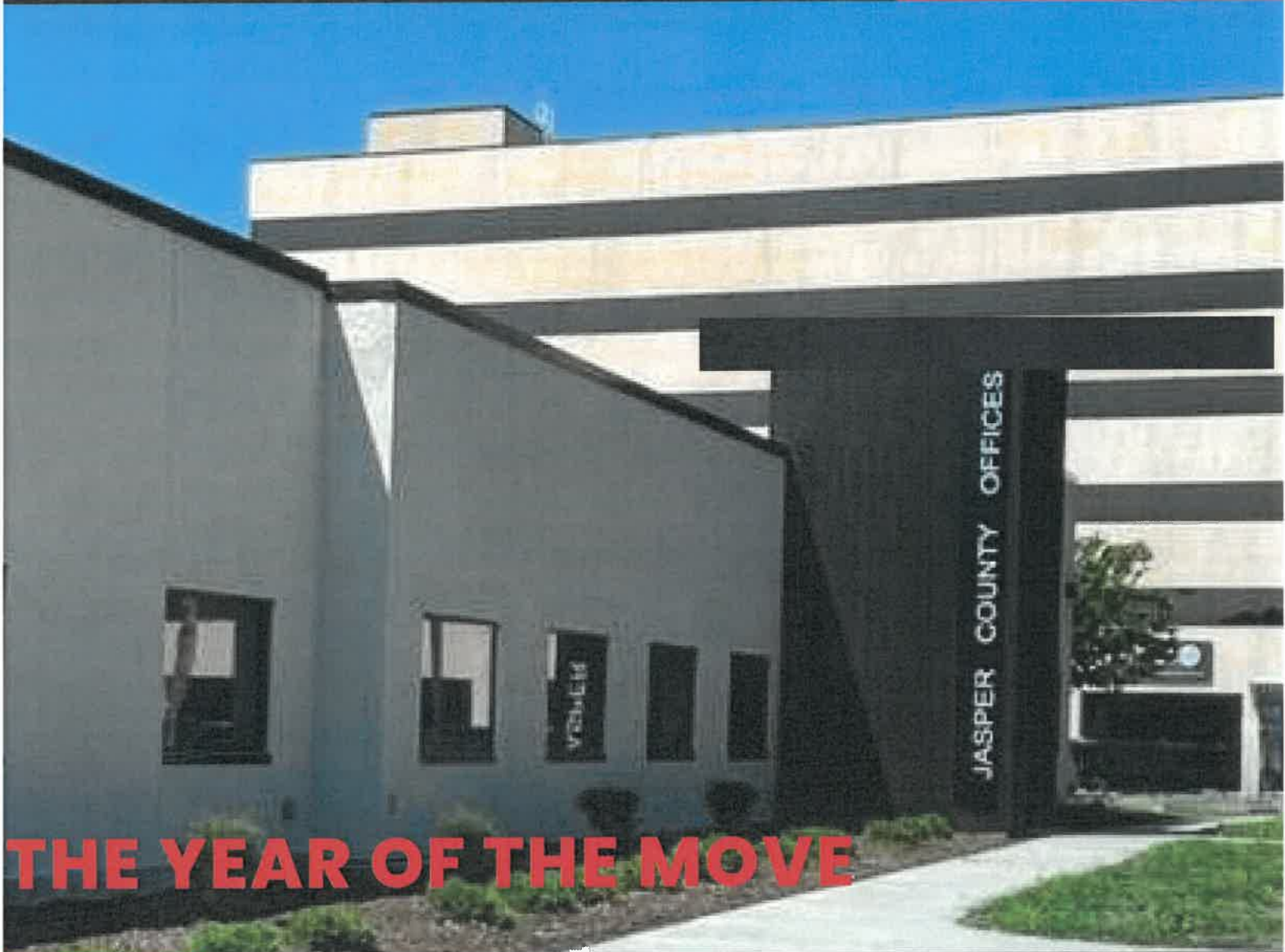

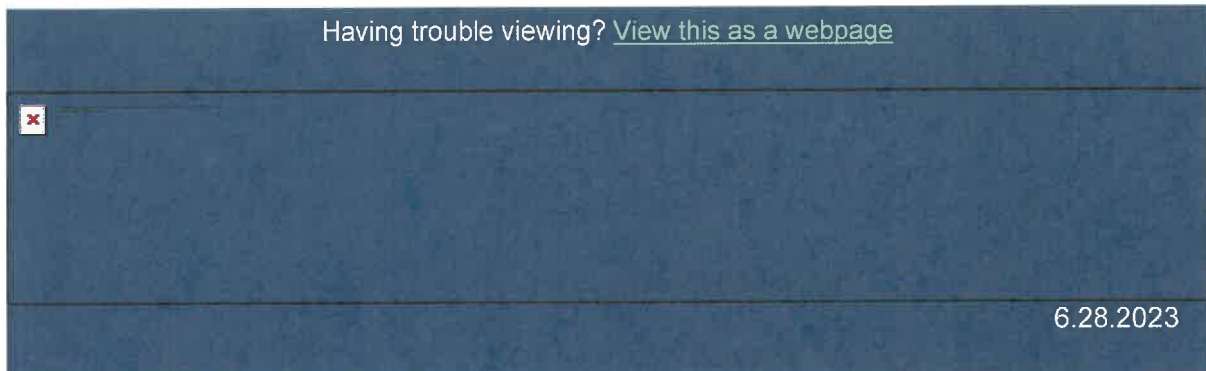

The Iowa Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) is working with Health Management Associates (HMA) to study the delivery of health and human service programs in our state. Currently, the health and human services systems function in silos. This is cumbersome and inefficient for those we serve and for our community partners.

The assessment will study why the current systems are structured the way they are, and the historical context of such decisions. The study will also examine existing operational capabilities and gaps, and the funding and resource models that drive the current system. This assessment will give HHS a clearer understanding of the linkages that currently exist between systems and current Medicaid programs, who the primary beneficiaries of these programs are, who the decision makers involved in each system are, and how to better connect these services to the Iowans who need them.

HVA 2023-2024

What is a Hazard Vulnerability Assessment?

A Hazard Vulnerability Assessment (HVA) is a systematic approach to identifying hazards of risks that are most likely to have an impact on your healthcare facility and the surrounding community. This can include the demand for the facility to provide services or its ability to provide those services. HVA tools will put each hazard in perspective using categories such as probability, human impact, property and business impact and mitigation strategies. HVA's are evolving documents. Healthcare facilities conduct and/or annually review their HVA. The process should involve community partners, at a minimum the County Emergency Management Agency (EMA).

Purpose of the HVA:

Drive the focus of your Emergency Preparedness Program, plan development and updating and training for your organization

Goals of the Healthcare Coalition (HCC) HVA:

- assess and rank potential HCC threats or hazards,
- identify any potential HCC or system wide vulnerabilities or gaps,
- promote implementation of hazard mitigation strategies and plans,
- develop/update the HCC 5-year training and exercise plan,
- promote information sharing across the HCC about best practices related to threat preparedness.

How to conduct the HVA:

1. Assemble a multidisciplinary team – no silos – minimum of EMA.
2. Choose a tool and list out different hazards.
3. As a team, discuss the impacts and current mitigation of each hazard.
4. Document in the chosen tool.
5. Review and rank hazards using the data from the tool.
6. Discuss how your agency plans to address the identified hazards.
